


Our Annual School Colour Fun Run has been postponed due to weather. We look forward to all students participating in the event on the first day back next term, Monday 14 October.

## **Message from the Deputies**

#### **School Bytes Attendance**

Regular attendance at school is essential to assist students to maximise their potential.

If your child is absent from school an explanation is required promptly. Listed below are a few options for parents to inform the school of their child's absence:

- 1. Email your child's teacher on the day of absence (all parents have been provided with their child's teachers email address).
- 2. Send your child's absence through School Bytes on the day of absence.
- 3. Write a letter to your child's teacher that is received the following day (only for single day absences as an explanation is required promptly).
- 4. Email the school riverbank-p.school@det.nsw.edu.au

All explanations are required within 2 days of your child being absent. An absence is unexplained if parents have failed to provide an appropriate explanation to the school within 7 days.

Late arrivals – There has been a significant increase in late arrivals. Any student who arrives after 8:45am must have an adult with them and be signed in at the office.

All students should be in the gate by half past eight.

**Extended Leave** - If you are taking a long term of absence (5 days or more), for example a holiday during the school term, you must inform the school's front office and complete a Certificate of Extended Leave. **Leave greater than 20 school days will not be approved.** Any documentation such as travel details, itinerary or flight bookings are needed to issue the extended leave certificate.

## **Playground Reminders**

#### Wearing the Riverbank hat at School

When at school, students are required to wear their Riverbank hat every day. This includes:

- before school
- at recess
- at lunch
- during fitness
- during sporting events
- when on an excursion
- when at high school pick up







If a student does not have their hat, they need to go to the cola, basketball court, synthetic grass or bus bay quiet area where there is shade.

If your child loses their hat, they can look in the lost property bucket, near the staffroom door, or it will need to be replaced with a new one. These can be purchased over the front counter at the office (\$20 cash only) or through Cowan and Lewis, our uniform provider.

#### **Items from Home**

Students can bring a handball or tennis ball from home to play handball during recess and lunch. We highly discourage students bringing items from home. This includes:

- toys
- collecting/trading cards, such as Pokémon cards, Woolworths cards
- other balls, such as basketballs, footballs, soccer balls
- items of value, such as jewellery, favourite toys, watches

## Changes to the Application Process for 2026 Entry to Selective High School and Opportunity Classes

From 2025, the placement tests for selective high schools and opportunity classes will move from single version paper-based tests to computer-based tests.

There will also be changes to the application process for 2026 entry to selective high schools and opportunity classes.

These changes will result in:

- a more engaging experience for students with computer-based testing
- a longer application period for parents and carers to apply.
- more choice for parents and carers of when their child will sit a placement test.
- outcomes being released earlier to parents and carers.

#### **Applying for entry**

Applications will be open each year from November to February (the following year) for both selective high school and opportunity class placement. Parents and carers will still apply online using the Selective high school and opportunity class placement application website.

Applications for selective high school and opportunity class entry in 2026 will be open from 7 November 2024 to 21 February 2025. There will be no late applications due to the longer application period, and the application closing date being closer to the test dates and logistical constraints around organising test centres and devices.

This change to the application period means that parents and carers will now need to apply for opportunity class placement when their child is in Year 3 (or by the end of Week 4, Term 1 when their child is in Year 4). This change applies to students currently in Year 3. For selective high school placement, parents and carers will continue to apply when their child is in Year 5 and can now apply when their child is in Year 6 until the end of Week 4, Term 1.

Note: the application process and timings for entry into a selective high school in Years 8 to 12 remain unchanged. For more information visit Selective high schools – Years 8 to 12 applications. Key dates – applying for entry in 2026

7 November 2024 to 21 February 2025 – parents and carers apply for selective high school or opportunity class entry in 2026.

2-4 May 2025 – students sit the selective high school or opportunity class placement test for entry in 2026.

19 May 2025 – make up test date (approved illness/misadventure requests)

Term 3, 2025 – placement outcomes and offers released to parents and carers.

Term 1, 2026 – students who gain entry begin attending their opportunity class or selective high school.

#### Health

During the cooler months, it is a timely reminder that the best way to reduce the spread of the flu and other viruses is for students to stay home when unwell.

If your child is unwell with a fever, chills, cough, sore throat, or runny nose they should stay at home until their symptoms are gone.

Our school will continue a combination of safety measures to minimise the transmission of illnesses. These include a combination of layered safety measures such as:

- A day cleaner has been employed by DoE from 10am to 2pm.
- Maintaining natural ventilation with windows and doors open whenever possible, including when cooling/heating systems are in use.
- Educating students on appropriate hygiene practices, such as regularly washing hands and covering their mouth or nose when sneezing or coughing.

Let's not be afraid to merge and meet, Come together, share ideas, and proudly speak Proud of our country, proud of our culture, and celebrate NAIDOC week






## **Attendance Road Map**



## **KINDERGARTEN**

Kindergarten students have had a busy end to Term 3. In English, students have explored characterisation through a range of texts, including 'No, Never!' and 'Clancy & Millie and the Very Fine House'. They have experimented with writing compound sentences as well as using adjectives and verbs to enhance their writing. In Mathematics, students have explored different strategies to share objects into equal groups. They have enjoyed using hands on materials to create and represent a range of patterns.

Science and Technology lessons have continued to be a clear highlight this term, with students using a variety of materials to design water resistant boats and test if they float. In Geography, students have been learning all about how to care for their favourite places, including our school. They even went on an interactive bushwalk! It has been a busy term of learning for all.

## YEAR 1

Year 1 have been exploring a range of quality picture books that explore the theme of memories. They have been learning to write about some of their own special memories and describing personal treasures that remind us of some of our favourite places and experiences. They learnt how to use simple paragraphs, noun groups and commas in their writing. The unit ended with students creating a letter to someone special in their lives to share their memories. Students worked hard to draft and publish their letters and are extremely proud of the writing they have produced!

In Music lessons, students have been exploring a variety of songs from different cultural groups around the world. They have enjoyed playing percussion instruments to hold a rhythm and singing simple songs in other languages including 'Kye Kye Kule' from Ghana and 'Haru Ga Kita' from Japan. Students have taken turns to perform in front of the class and provide constructive feedback to their peers. They have learnt about different groups of instruments in an orchestra and can describe the pitch and beat in songs that have been enjoyed together.

## YEAR 2

Year 2 have been exploring fractions of objects and collections in Mathematics sessions. They have enjoyed using hands on experiences to practise making halves, quarters and eighths of objects, using playdoh and different paper shapes. Students have then applied this knowledge in making equal parts, to find fractions of collections. They have compared the size of different fractional parts to find equivalence. Students have used this to solve real-world problems, including how to equally share treats into party bags.

In Creative Arts, students have been exploring rhythm and beat and have enjoyed using percussion instruments to make music. They have worked collaboratively to create their own musical sequences and have had fun presenting them to their peers. Students have demonstrated their creativity in their art lessons, using different techniques and types of media to create their own artwork. They have studied famous artwork, including Monet's 'Waterlilies' to explore the use of colour, light and different brushstrokes. They have done an amazing job recreating their own version.

## YEAR 3

During the latter half of the term, Year 3 have been engaging in a study of the fantasy novel *Rowan* of *Rin* with a focus on characterisation in narratives. They have immersed themselves in a wide range of literacy activities and students have had the opportunity to compose imaginative stories that emphasise character development through dialogue and descriptive detail.

In Geography activities, students have been learning about Australia and its neighbouring countries. They have enjoyed using digital tools such as Google Maps, as well as creating their own maps on paper, to research and record information on landmarks, names of locations as well as significant natural features of Australia and other countries.

Year 3 have also enjoyed opportunities to create artworks connected to other learning such as Olympic sports, planets in the solar system, and dragons from *Rowan of Rin*.


## YEAR 6

During Term 3, Year 6 students engaged in an exciting project that challenged their problem-solving skills by designing a 3D sketch of a student workstation. This task involved more than just drawing; also requiring them to think critically about the various components that make up an effective and functional workspace. Students brainstormed an array of ideas before completing a draft drawing that prioritised elements based on student needs, such as incorporating ergonomic features or optimising space.

Once they had a clear plan that included accurate measurements, user friendly features and sustainable materials, students used their problem-solving skills to translate their ideas into the technical drawing program, Sketch Up. This involved determining proportions, angles, and spatial relationships to ensure the workstation was both practical and visually appealing.

## **About Indigenous Literacy Day**


Indigenous Literacy Day is proudly produced and presented by the Indigenous Literacy Foundation in collaboration with the Sydney Opera House.

## **Restorative Practices**

Restorative Practices form the relational basis for Quality Teaching and Learning at Riverbank Public School. Our Restorative Practice Framework, because of its explicit nature, offers a common language and practice capable of fostering healthy relationships.

Student achievement is enhanced through Restorative values being embedded as a way of being and learning together. Our approach fosters individual responsibility and helps develop empathy. Inappropriate behaviour or choices and mistakes can be viewed as an opportunity for insight, learning and development in both the academic and social domains.

The explicit framework is inextricably linked to the Quality Teaching Framework and includes the following sets of questions to be asked by children, teachers, and parents.

When Things Go Wrong.... When Someone Has Been Hurt

- What happened?
- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you may do to make things right?
- What did you think when you realised what happened?
- What impact has this incident had on you and others?
- What has been the hardest thing for you?
- What do you think needs to happen to make things right?

The process is empowering as it takes students from the past to the present and gives them hope for the future. It empowers them to make things right and heal any harm that has been done.

A restorative classroom setting is one that values dialogue through an inclusive approach where everyone expects to be heard and through this participatory process, students develop the capacity to learn that emotions are an important and legitimate expression of healthy dialogue. This process helps students to deal with conflict, tensions and difference in respectful ways that engender trust and foster healthy relationships.

#### **School Motto**

The school's motto, 'Learning to Live, Living to Learn', reinforces a broad and enriching curriculum, which not only focuses on the development of literacy and numeracy skills but also on the social and emotional wellbeing of the students whilst respecting a culturally diverse community.



## **RPS Medical Procedures**

#### **Prescribed Medication:**

When a medical practitioner has prescribed medication that must be administered during the school day, parents/carers must:

- notify the school.
- provide up to date information as required.
- supply the medication and any 'consumables' necessary for its administration in a timely way.
- complete the Riverbank Public School Medical Permission Note (please see the office for a copy of this note).

The administration of prescribed medication in schools is carried out by staff who volunteer and who are trained. Students must not carry medication unless there is a written agreement between the school and the student's parents/carers.

#### **Individual Health Care Plans:**

An individual health care plan must be developed for:

- severe asthma, type 1 diabetes, epilepsy, and anaphylaxis
- any student who is diagnosed as having a condition that may require an emergency response.
- any student who requires the administration of health care procedures

If your child has any health conditions and does not already have an existing individual health care plan, please contact the office to collect the required forms.

If your child has an adrenaline auto injector (EpiPen) prescribed by a medical practitioner, an <u>Action Plan for Anaphylaxis</u> must be completed. If the school does not have a current, Action Plan for Anaphylaxis please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.

If your child has allergic reactions where no adrenaline autoinjector is prescribed by a medical practitioner, an <u>Action Plan For Allergic Reactions</u> must be completed. If the school does not have a current Action Plan for Allergic Reactions, please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.

If your child has been prescribed by a medical practitioner as having asthma, an <u>Asthma Action Plan</u> is required. If the school does not have a current Asthma Action Plan, please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.

# **Lost Property**

Our lost property tubs are located outside the staffroom and are checked daily by staff. Lost property which is labelled will be returned to students the following day.

Please ensure that all uniforms, lunchboxes, and water bottles are labelled with your child's name.



## **Dropping Off and Picking Up students**

A 'Kiss and Ride Zone' or 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area utilises existing 'No Parking' zones around schools. In these areas, drivers may stop to drop off or pick up children, however **No Parking** rules apply:

- Maximum stop time is 2 minutes.
- Driver must remain in or within 3 metres of the vehicle.
- Vehicle must not be left unattended.

## Additional safety tips for school zones:

- Always drop-off or pick-up your child from the designated area, following the school's procedures.
- Make sure children use the footpath-side door when getting in and out of a car.
- Make sure the hand brake is applied when the vehicle is stationary.
- Never double park
- Never Park across a pedestrian crossing
- Never undertake a U-turn near the school.

#### Safety Tips for Students:

- Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped in the 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area.
- Make sure your school bag and other items are in a safe position, e.g., on the floor.
- Be ready to get out of the car with your belongings when the car has stopped, and you have unbuckled your seatbelt.
- Always get in and out of the backseat of the vehicle through the safety door the rear footpath-side door.

#### **No Stopping**



What does it mean? You cannot stop in this area FOR ANY REASON (including queuing or waiting for space).

Why is it there? Keeps clear sight lines between drivers and children/pedestrians. Penalty \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)

#### **No Parking**



What does it mean? You can stop in a NO PARKING zone for a maximum of two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. If no spaces are available, you cannot queue on the roadway or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up. You must always stay within three metres of your vehicle.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for children/pedestrian set down and pick up.

**Penalty** \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)

#### **Bus Zone**



What does it mean? You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up school children.

**Penalty** \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)

#### **Pedestrian Crossings**

You must not stop within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking. Why is it there? To ensure that children can be clearly seen by vehicles approaching the crossing.



Penalty \$439 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone).

#### Footpaths, Driveways and Nature Strips




You must not stop on any footpath or nature strip, or even a driveway crossing a footpath or nature strip FOR ANY REASON.

**Why is it there?** You could easily run over a child or force pedestrians onto the road to get around you.

**Penalty** \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)

## **Double Parking**




You must not stop on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time even to drop off or pick up passengers.

Why is it there? Double parking forces other cars to go around you cause traffic congestion and reduces the view of drivers and children crossing the road.

**Penalty** \$330 Demerit points (School Zone)

The school is very fortunate to have dedicated volunteers who assist in the safe pick-up of students in this area. Please follow any instruction given to you by these volunteers in order to keep the children safe.


