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Year 5 Canberra Camp Report

In Week 4 of Term 3 Year 5 students enjoyed a great trip to Canberra. Students were given the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy. The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government contributed funding of \$20 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program towards those costs.

The camp started with all students at school bright and early at 6:00am eager to get on the way to Canberra. We broke up the 3 hour bus trip with a rest stop at Berrima where the students could stretch their legs and have something to eat. We arrived in Canberra and went straight to the Australian Institute of Sport. We had a tour of the AIS which included time spent in the Sportex area where students were able to participate in a range of sporting activities. We enjoyed fun and safe interactive displays, learned about the history of Australian sport and were inspired to be active and play sport. It was time for lunch and to start to head off to the first of our activities. All groups visited Questacon, Australian War Memorial, Mount Ainslie Lookout, Parliament House, Old Parliament House, Snowy Hydro Scheme and Selwyn Snowfields over the 3 days. A brief overview of what Riverbank students experienced is below:

- Questacon: students spent an afternoon exploring the many hands on and creative zones that Questacon had to offer. The earthquake room was a highlight and students braved their fears on the free fall.
- Australia War Memorial: all Riverbank students understood the significance of the War Memorial and respectfully looked at the exhibits and Roll of Honour.
- Mount Ainslie Lookout: the highest point of Mount Ainslie provided a great view of the sights of Canberra
- Parliament House: the visit allowed us to go into both the Senate and House of Representatives to learn about our democratic system.
- Old Parliament House: we were treated to a tour of Old Parliament House where we learnt about our past Prime Ministers and students got to sit where our politicians once did.
- Selwyn Snowfields and Snowy Hydro Scheme: At Cooma we learnt about the amazing engineering behind the Snowy Hydro Scheme before heading to Selwyn Snowfields for our

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snow adventure. All students had fun playing in the ample amount of snow on offer. Students and teachers had fun building snow castles and throwing snow balls.

We had a fun trip home with the much anticipated McDonalds stop. It was quite an experience feeding 153 hungry students with two other schools in attendance at the same time.

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Restorative Practices

Restorative Practices form the relational basis for Quality Teaching and Learning at Riverbank Public School. Our Restorative Practice Framework, because of its explicit nature, offers a common language and practice capable of fostering healthy relationships.

Student achievement is enhanced through Restorative values being embedded as a way of being and learning together. Our approach fosters individual responsibility and helps develop empathy. Inappropriate behaviour or choices and mistakes can be viewed as an opportunity for insight, learning and development in both the academic and social domains.

The explicit framework is inextricably linked to the Quality Teaching Framework and includes the following sets of questions to be asked by children, teachers and parents.

When Things Go Wrong.....When Someone Has Been Hurt

- What happened?
- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you may do to make things right?
- What did you think when you realised what happened?
- What impact has this incident had on you and others?
- What has been the hardest thing for you?
- What do you think needs to happen to make things right?

The process is empowering as it takes students from the past to the present and gives them hope for the future. It empowers them to make things right and heal any harm that has been done.

A restorative classroom setting is one that values dialogue through an inclusive approach where everyone expects to be heard and through this participatory process, students develop the capacity to learn that emotions are an important and legitimate expression of healthy dialogue. This process helps students to deal with conflict, tensions and difference in respectful ways that engender trust and foster healthy relationships.

The school's motto, 'Learning to Live, Living to Learn', reinforces a broad and enriching curriculum, which not only focuses on the development of literacy and numeracy skills but also on the social and emotional wellbeing of the students whilst respecting a culturally diverse community.

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

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Dropping Off and Picking Up students

A 'Kiss and Ride Zone' or 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area utilises existing 'No Parking' zones around schools. In these areas, drivers may stop to drop off or pick up children, however **No Parking** rules apply:

- Maximum stop time is 2 minutes
- Driver must remain in or within 3 metres of the vehicle
- Vehicle must not be left unattended.

Additional safety tips for school zones:

- Always drop-off or pick-up your child from the designated area, following the school's procedures
- Make sure children use the footpath-side door when getting in and out of a car
- Make sure the hand brake is applied when the vehicle is stationary
- Never double park
- Never park across a pedestrian crossing
- Never undertake a U-turn in close proximity to the school.

Safety Tips for Students:

- Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped in the 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area
- Make sure your school bag and other items are in a safe position, e.g. on the floor
- Be ready to get out of the car with your belongings when the car has stopped and you have unbuckled your seatbelt
- Always get in and out of the backseat of the vehicle through the safety door the rear footpath-side door.

General parking rules


You must not stop your vehicle (that is, bring it to a stop and either stay with the vehicle or leave it parked) in the following circumstances:


- Double parked (that is in the road alongside a car that is parked)
- On or across a driveway or footpath
- On footpaths and nature strips
- In a safety zone or within 10 metres before or after a safety zone

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- Within an intersection
- Within 1 metre of another vehicle parked in front or behind
- Within 10 metres of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic
- Within 3 metres of any double centre lines
- On or within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a children's crossing or pedestrian Crossing





No Stopping

What does it mean? You cannot stop in this area FOR ANY REASON (including queuing or waiting for space).

Why is it there? Keeps clear sight lines between drivers and children/pedestrians.

Penalty \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)



No Parking

What does it mean? You can stop in a NO PARKING zone for a maximum of two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. If no spaces are available, you cannot queue on the road way or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up. You must stay within three metres of your vehicle at all times.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for children/pedestrian set down and pick up. Penalty \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)



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Bus Zone

What does it mean? You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up school children.

Penalty \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)



Pedestrian Crossings



You must not stop within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking.

Why is it there? To ensure that children can be clearly seen by vehicles approaching the crossing. Penalty \$439 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)

Footpaths, Driveways and Nature Strips

You must not stop on any footpath or nature strip, or even a driveway crossing a footpath or nature strip FOR ANY REASON.


Why is it there? You could easily run over a child or force pedestrians onto the road to get around you.

Penalty \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)



Double Parking

You must not stop on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time even to drop off or pick up passengers.



Science Week 2019

This year's science week theme was 'Destination Moon: more missions, more science'. Such a theme proved to be a great way to investigate previous missions to the Moon and space along with examining what we do and don't know about our universe. It allowed students to look at and create change, to experience unsolvable problems and how they could be or were cracked. Furthermore, they were encouraged to stretch their minds, think beyond our planet and engage their imaginations.



Early Stage I



There were a few pops, fizzes and 'ooh's to be heard amongst our Kindergarten classrooms as students were engaged in activities about change. Children were able to create and see how change occurs using a number of differing substances from skittles, to jelly crystals and icing sugar.



Stage I

It was an exciting time in Stage 1 as we undertook our activities for science week. Some tasks had us viewing and making constellations such as Leo the lion or Pegasus the flying horse. Others required us to construct balloon rockets that could one day take us closer to those constellations. Perhaps the fuel our rockets use could be the power contained within a Berocca tablet. Who's to know but our investigations continue.



Stage 2



Rockets were launched using the effervescence of Berocca and distances to those far off reaches in our galaxy were plotted and calculated with toilet paper. Our universe is certainly vast. Other activities required students to invoke their creativity to design air craft using air currents for speed, mixing liquids that continuously moved and investigate how to refract light. The activities were demanding but students relished the challenges.

Stage 3 students enjoyed participating in three problem experiments. solvina We learnt about the different density some liquids, how to make sherbet and how make Oobleck to slime. Some tasting was involved along with some unpleasant and unexpected results.








STEAM NEWY...

Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Maths

This term, Stage 2 are busy designing sustainable edible school gardens with outdoor learning areas in small groups during their STEAM lessons! They have been given dimensions of a piece of land to work within, researched sustainability and how this can apply to a school garden, and then brainstormed ideas about how their garden can include as many of these ideas as possible. They have collaborated in their groups to discuss layout, relevance and size of features. This has led to some fantastic garden architectural drawings which are really quite impressive!









The students will now begin the process of designing 3D prototypes which they will soon print on our 3D printers and place on their drawn garden plans!

To present their projects, the students will code <u>Ozobot robots</u> to navigate around their gardens. The robots will stop at each part of their gardens, allowing the groups time to explain each aspect and how it contributes to sustainability as the robot pauses!
