PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

A warm welcome to our new students and families who have joined our school community. I trust you will enjoy a long and happy association with our school.

This year, I have formed 82 mainstream classes and 4 Inclusive Education classes, placing our current school enrolment at 2140.

At RPS we take pride in setting high expectations for our students who are the very centre of our structured learning environment. Our Restorative Practice philosophy provides a framework for building strong relationships, effective communication, personal and social responsibility, and a sense of belonging. My teachers and I aim to improve student outcomes, implement effective evidence-based programs and explicit teaching methods.



Education in a changing world has a vital role to play in preparing students for successful, enriched lives. Our students are challenged, yet nurtured, and work both independently and in groups to solve authentic problems. Students accumulate a strong repertoire of general capabilities including literacy, numeracy, creative and critical thinking, intercultural understanding, ethical understanding, information, and communication technologies as well as personal and social responsibilities. Parents are valued as true partners in the education of their children. All students have the opportunity to attain knowledge, skills, values and attitudes, enabling them to be reflective, self-sufficient learners. Riverbank believes in every student, and our aim is to support them to achieve their potential by enabling lifelong learning.

School Attendance

Students are required to attend school every day, whether it is the first or last day of the term. NAPLAN

Each year the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is undertaken by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Students will participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

NAPLAN 2024 will take place from Wednesday 13 March to Monday 25 March.

NAPLAN is just one part of our school learning assessment program. The tests assess literacy and numeracy skills your child is already learning at school.

In preparation for NAPLAN, our school will undertake activities to help students become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked. Excessive preparation for NAPLAN is not required nor recommended.

The public demonstration site (https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site) is available to see the types of questions, tools and functions used in the NAPLAN tests.

Setting our Goals for 2024

Shafiya's (4A) artwork is over 8 metres wide and looks spectacular when walking through our school entrance. Danya, who now attends The Ponds HS, had her masterpiece painted in our garden which is named, 'Matta Yellamundi Dumarang' which means 'Place of Storytellers & Flowering Plants' in the local Darug language.

Thank you to Bindi Bindi Art who transformed our students' designs to these remarkable murals.





Premier's Reading Challenge

The Premier's Reading Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students, and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and to read more widely. The Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) is open to all NSW students in Kindergarten to Year 10.

Message from the Deputies

After-School Activities

After-school activities have commenced. Please refer to the schedule and contact details for our after-school activity providers at the conclusion of this newsletter.

Special Religious Education (SRE) and Special Education in Ethics (SEE)

Students at Riverbank undertake SRE lessons for one term.

- Term 1 Stage 3
- Term 2 Stage 2
- Term 3 Stage 1
- Term 4 Kindergarten

Students in Stage 3 have commenced their SRE lessons. We offer half hour lessons from 1:45pm from approved providers in the following:

Combined Christian, Catholic, Hindu, Islamic and Sikh. Students will continue in the same arrangement as the previous year unless a parent/caregiver requests a change in writing.

This year, we are continuing to offer Special Education in Ethics (SEE) lessons at the same time as SRE. SEE is provided for students whose parents have withdrawn them from special religious education. The approved provider of SEE is Primary Ethics. Expression of Interest forms for SEE will be sent to families by Mrs Muir prior to your child's term.

Late Drop off and Early Pick Up

If you are picking up your child early, you must go to the school office and sign them out before your child can leave. If a student is late arriving to school, you must sign them in at the front office before they go to class. Students cannot sign themselves in or out of school.

Bike and Scooter Safety - Always wear a helmet when you ride or skate

All bicycle and scooter riders are required by law to wear an approved helmet that is securely fitted and fastened. We are observing an increased number of students now riding bikes and scooters with their helmets. Thank you to our school community for ensuring students are riding safely to and from school.

Extended Leave

The Department of Education does not accept family holidays and travel as reasons for exemption from school. An application for a Certificate of Extended Leave for Travel must be applied for through the school office for leave of more than 5 days and approved by the Principal. Leave greater than 20 school days will not be approved. The application needs to be made a minimum of ten school days

before travel and documents such as air/ship/train tickets, accommodation confirmation or a travel itinerary for domestic and/or international travel must be provided.

Traffic and Parking Near the School

As we have welcomed many new families to our school community in 2024, We remind you it is crucial that we all follow road rules and are patient and careful when driving around our school zone each morning and afternoon. The safety and wellbeing of our students is paramount. The school's Kiss and Drop area is within the "No Parking" zones and are located on Wentworth Street and Riverbank Drive. You are only allowed to stop your vehicle to set down or pick up passengers and must not stop for more than 2 minutes. The driver must not be more than 3 metres from the vehicle. Highway patrol will be regularly patrolling our perimeter. Thank you for ensuring the safety of all our students when entering and leaving the premises.

Allergies

Anaphylaxis is a potentially life threatening, severe allergic reaction which occurs after exposure to an allergen (usually to foods, insects or medicines), to which a person is already extremely sensitive. We have several students at Riverbank Public School with anaphylaxis and similar allergic conditions and our staff undertake face-to-face and online training in providing an emergency response to this condition. The parents of our anaphylactic and allergic students work hard to educate their children about the risks of sharing food, as do our teachers. As this is a potentially life-threatening condition, we ask that you please consider these students before sending high-risk products such as peanut butter, Nutella and seafood in school lunchboxes. Please talk to your child about the potential risks of sharing food and ask them to wash their hands after eating any nut-based or seafood products. Thank you for your understanding, our anaphylactic children and their families appreciate your support.


YEAR 5

- Work collaboratively with the classroom teacher and parents to support additional educational needs and identify specific learning goals
- · Plan, implement, model, monitor and evaluate teaching programs for students with additional learning needs in conjunction with classroom teachers
- · Model exemplary classroom practice through collaborative teaching
- · Provide direct support for students with additional EAL/D or learning and support needs in class, individually or within small groups. The areas of support include social integration, language and communication, literacy, numeracy and behaviour
- · Deliver intensive English support for students who HAVE recently arrived in Australia
- · Conduct meetings with parents to ensure we are working together as a team to best meet the needs of our students
- · Collect data through assessment to determine specific area/s of need
- · Maintain positive connections with parents and the community
- Provide support to both teachers and parents when developing Individualised Learning Plans (ILP)
- · Liaise with external agencies such as occupational and speech therapists to support student needs

The role of the School Counsellor is to:

- · Advocate and support the wellbeing of students and their families
- · Provide specialised psychological assessment, counselling and intervention services for students with different needs
- · Assess students' learning and behaviour

TECH UPDATE

Students at Riverbank are engaged in the safe and practical use of digital devices both when at school and as part of everyday life. With ICT capability being a core component of 21st century learning, it is important for parents, students, and staff to understand best practices around ICT usage. This knowledge ensures that students have a well-rounded understanding of the expectations of themselves and others when engaging online.

Some quick tips for parents and carers to help with safe device usage include:

- 1. Have an understanding of the applications and programs present on devices that are accessible to children. If you are unsure of what an application does, it may be helpful to speak about usage of the software before deleting or removing it.
- 2. Encourage children to report any concerns or issues that may arise during device usage. Children may be worried about being criticised, losing device privileges or upsetting their parents when reporting issues so try to focus the conversation on the issue they have reported and how you are supporting them through resolving it.
- 3. Discuss with children who they are communicating with online. Explain that it is safest to communicate with people that we know in person when working online and teach your children to be alert around the types of information they may share online.

These tips can help children use digital technologies safely and allow you to be involved in open communication with them about their habits and practices online so that they feel comfortable discussing the topic with you.



Time online

Help your child manage their online time

- Stay engaged and encourage balance keep an eye
 on the games, apps and devices your child uses by
 sharing screen time with them. Help them stay aware of
 their important offline activities, like hobbies and sports.
- Create a plan involve your child in creating a family plan that balances time spent sitting in front of screens, with a variety of offline activities.
- Use the available technologies parental controls and tools to monitor online time allow you to measure and set time limits on device use or internet access. But be honest and open with your children about why you want to use these technologies.





In the gate by half past 8






School App Tip

Restorative Practices

Restorative Practices form the relational basis for Quality Teaching and Learning at Riverbank Public School. Our Restorative Practice Framework, because of its explicit nature, offers a common language and practice capable of fostering healthy relationships.

Student achievement is enhanced through Restorative values being embedded as a way of being and learning together. Our approach fosters individual responsibility and helps develop empathy. Inappropriate behaviour or choices and mistakes can be viewed as an opportunity for insight, learning and development in both the academic and social domains.

The explicit framework is inextricably linked to the Quality Teaching Framework and includes the following sets of questions to be asked by children, teachers, and parents.

- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?

The process is empowering as it takes students from the past to the present and gives them hope for the future. It empowers them to make things right and heal any harm that has been done. A restorative classroom setting is one that values dialogue through an inclusive approach where everyone expects to be heard and through this participatory process, students develop the capacity to learn that emotions are an important and legitimate expression of healthy dialogue. This process helps students to deal with conflict, tensions and difference in respectful ways that engender trust





RPS Medical Procedures

Prescribed Medication:

When a medical practitioner has prescribed medication that must be administered during the school day, parents/carers must:

- notify the school.
- provide up to date information as required.
- supply the medication and any 'consumables' necessary for its administration in a timely way.
- complete the Riverbank Public School Medical Permission Note (please see the office for a copy of this note).

The administration of prescribed medication in schools is carried out by staff who volunteer and who are trained. Students must not carry medication unless there is a written agreement between the school and the student's parents/carers.

Individual Health Care Plans:

An individual health care plan must be developed for:

- severe asthma, type 1 diabetes, epilepsy, and anaphylaxis
- any student who is diagnosed as having a condition that may require an emergency response.
- any student who requires the administration of health care procedures

If your child has any health conditions and does not already have an existing individual health care plan, please contact the office to collect the required forms.

If your child has an adrenaline auto injector (EpiPen) prescribed by a medical practitioner, an <u>Action Plan for Anaphylaxis</u> must be completed. If the school does not have a current, Action Plan for Anaphylaxis please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.


If your child has allergic reactions where no adrenaline autoinjector is prescribed by a medical practitioner, an <u>Action Plan For Allergic Reactions</u> must be completed. If the school does not have a current Action Plan for Allergic Reactions, please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.

If your child has been prescribed by a medical practitioner as having asthma, an <u>Asthma Action Plan</u> is required. If the school does not have a current Asthma Action Plan, please have your child's doctor complete one immediately.

Lost Property

Our lost property tubs are located outside the staffroom and are checked daily by staff. Lost property which is labelled will be returned to students the following day.

Please ensure that all uniforms, lunchboxes, and water bottles are labelled with your child's name.



Dropping Off and Picking Up students

A 'Kiss and Ride Zone' or 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area utilises existing 'No Parking' zones around schools. In these areas, drivers may stop to drop off or pick up children, however **No Parking** rules apply:

- Maximum stop time is 2 minutes.
- Driver must remain in or within 3 metres of the vehicle.
- Vehicle must not be left unattended.

Additional safety tips for school zones:

- Always drop-off or pick-up your child from the designated area, following the school's procedures.
- Make sure children use the footpath-side door when getting in and out of a car.
- Make sure the hand brake is applied when the vehicle is stationary.
- Never double park
- Never Park across a pedestrian crossing
- Never undertake a U-turn near the school.

Safety Tips for Students:

- Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped in the 'Drop-off and Pick-up' area.
- Make sure your school bag and other items are in a safe position, e.g., on the floor.
- Be ready to get out of the car with your belongings when the car has stopped, and you have unbuckled your seatbelt.
- Always get in and out of the backseat of the vehicle through the safety door the rear footpath-side door.

No Stopping



What does it mean? You cannot stop in this area FOR ANY REASON (including queuing or waiting for space).

Why is it there? Keeps clear sight lines between drivers and children/pedestrians. Penalty \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)

No Parking



What does it mean? You can stop in a NO PARKING zone for a maximum of two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. If no spaces are available, you cannot queue on the roadway or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up. You must always stay within three metres of your vehicle.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for children/pedestrian set down and pick up. **Penalty** \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)

Bus Zone



What does it mean? You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus.

Why is it there? To provide a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up school children.

Penalty \$330 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone)

Pedestrian Crossings

You must not stop within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking. Why is it there? To ensure that children can be clearly seen by vehicles approaching the crossing.



Penalty \$439 + 2 Demerit Points (School Zone).

Footpaths, Driveways and Nature Strips




You must not stop on any footpath or nature strip, or even a driveway crossing a footpath or nature strip FOR ANY REASON.

Why is it there? You could easily run over a child or force pedestrians onto the road to get around you.

Penalty \$183 + 2 Demerit points (School Zone)

Double Parking



You must not stop on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time even to drop off or pick up passengers.

Why is it there? Double parking forces other cars to go around you cause traffic congestion and reduces the view of drivers and children crossing the road.

Penalty \$330 Demerit points (School Zone)

The school is very fortunate to have dedicated volunteers who assist in the safe pick-up of students in this area. Please follow any instruction given to you by these volunteers in order to keep the children safe.
